Tasks	 Task-1 Looking at the military metaphor Work in pairs. Looking at the military metaphor, discuss these questions with your partner. Write down a summary of your opinion. 1. How does the speaker describe the nettles – what are they? 2. The speaker lights a fire to burn the nettles but he doesn't describe it in these terms? What does he say? Why? 3. How effective or ineffective do you think the metaphor is and why? 4. Does this poem tell us anything about the wider world or is it purely about one man and his son?
