1. What has happened to cause Victor's arrest? What happens to Victor after his arrest?
 What is Victor doing to fall asleep?
 Throughout Frankenstein, Victor addresses Walton with rhetorical questions: "Why did I not die?" He does this several times when describing his emotions when he sees Clerval dead in a casket. How does this affect your reading? Does it impact your reaction to Frankenstein and his experiences? Does it remind you that it is a retelling? Does it interrupt your reading? Does it enrich your understanding of the text? Does it add another element to the story?
4. In a fever after the death of Clerval, Frankenstein imagines the creature attacking him: "Towards morning I was possessed by a kind of nightmare; I felt the fiend's grasp in my neck and could not free myself from it; groans and cries rang in my ears." Besides the monster actually killing Victor, what could this foreshadow or symbolize?
