# A WORLD OF WORDS: EMIRATES LITFEST 2025

Touted as "The Arab World's largest celebration of the written and spoken word", Emirates Litfest is a week-long annual event featuring an eclectic mix of author sessions, competitions and more. It has been an avenue for people to share their ideas and passions and leave every year having learned something new.

This year, our school participated in a variety of competitions with our hard working students giving it their all and representing the school with pride.

### **Chevron Readers Cup**

This competition was a team event with participation from schools all across the GCC nations with hundreds of schools taking part in both the Arabic and English versions. Here's how it works: students, in teams of four, (from primary and secondary categories) are assigned a set of books, and then given time to prepare for quizzes based on the content of these. This event usually spans a period of 3–5 months, starting with a preliminary round and culminating in the finals in which only the best 20 teams take part in.

This year, with Mr. Ahmed and Ms. Rama training the Arabic teams and Ms. Renthi helping the English teams, our school did really well in the semi finals. After a tremendous struggle and an earnest effort, all our primary teams, both English and Arabic, secured spots in the finals! Our secondary teams are not to be forgotten either, one of the Arabic teams made it to the finals, while both the English teams just barely fell short and received honorable mentions for their incredible efforts.



According to the participants, the toughest part of the competition was learning as many details as they could from the books, no matter how seemingly insignificant they were. With each team having 4 people and 4 books between them, it was a challenge having to answer a slew of questions from all the books. In the end, our teams overcame this hurdle through teamwork.



On January 30th, the finals took place in the Intercontinental hotel, Dubai. In a display of our academic prowess, our primary teams for English secured 2nd and 3rd place while in Arabic, one of our primary teams took 2nd place.

When asked about the inspiration behind her choice poem, she told us that she felt she could relate to the difficulties that Malala Yousafzai struggled through to get to where she was and admired how she "stood up for what is right."



Emirates Litfest also featured a series of individual competitions such as the Letter and Story writing competitions which were based on individual literary skill and talent.

For the letter writing competition, students were asked to write a letter to their favourite author and Jamie from 6E, through her masterful penmanship won second place in the junior category.

For Jamie, her choice was Efua Traoré, author of the book One Chance Dance. Her inspiration? She loved the book, she liked the author, so she decided to write about it. In her letter, she wrote her own extract based on the story of the book, impressing the judges securing her a podium position in the competition.



But the competitions are not all, this year our school was given the chance to host two esteemed Litfest authors: Mr. Joe Roman, a marine ecologist and author of Eat, Poop, Die: How Animals Make Our World and Ms. Helen Czerski, a physicist, former television presenter, oceanographer and author of Blue Machine: How the Ocean Shapes Our World.



The author visit proved to be an engaging experience for the senior students, with our guests taking the time to answer questions from the audience (we now know what causes whale poop colours), displaying their passion for their respective fields and leaving the students with a deeper appreciation for the ocean and the natural world.



"Cliched as it may sound, Litfest really does help foster a love for reading in children. Through author sessions and competitions like Reader's cup, it encourages children to become avid readers. This is important because unlike visual arts, books encourage creativity and imagination, enabling us to visualize entire worlds as we read. And as we all know, imagination is definitely the key to human progress." – said Mrs Renthi, our librarian, who has been coaching students for competitions, arranging author visits etc. as part of Emirates Litfest for a few years now.

Litfest has always been an integral part of the academic calendar of St. Mary's, and this year was no different; a truly riveting showcase of our school's talent and love for learning and literature.



### AL DIYAFAH SCIENCE COMPETITION

### THE SHOWCASE OF INTELLECT AND CREATIVITY

Science shapes our universe. Imagination paves the way for science to blossom. We experience both in our day to day lives, outlining our limits and laws; but what if you could defy those limits? That is what the Al Diyafah Science Competition aimed for — challenging students' innovation and wits.

Talented students representing Saintz were invited to display their ingenious prowess in the competition. Under the guidance of Ms. Susanna, our Head of the Department for Science and Ms. Lovey, Head of Primary Science, our students set about the task of designing a project that exhibits sustainability and innovation. Sitting in the boys science room brainstorming, their minds flowing with ideas, the students had to come up with something under a time constraint.

The senior students (Hayden, Rashmika, Sandil and Sofia) opted for a water desalination project, a process that produces clean potable water from saline water that is safe for human consumption, industrial uses, and even irrigation by removing salt and various other minerals and contaminants.

However, the question remained: how exactly are they going to portray desalination in a new light while simultaneously utilising material readily available to them? The answer: by demonstrating water purification through its humble beginnings, a water desalination treatment plant, and also through arts and crafts!

Our students made varied water purification processes, such as a few sedimentation tanks, used to remove suspended contaminants and particles in the water, and water treatment systems, used to get rid of any harmful chemicals or microorganisms left in the water. Not just the processes were displayed though; the group had even included the final destinations of the clean water! This includes a house (much like yours and mine, only the roof is made of popsicle sticks!), and a factory made of cardboard to represent industrial usage, complete with a wind turbine whose blades are old plastic utensils!



While the task may sound easy, it was certainly no walk in the park. Our students faced difficulties, as many group projects do. When they encountered these obstacles, they turned to their teachers as well as science competition veteran Zoya Kakhu of Year 13, who acted as a beacon of inspiration to the young minds, guiding them with her input.

The junior team (Chiara, Jamie, Joshua and Liam) also put on their thinking caps and set about finding an eco-friendly idea that could help make the world a better place. And our little ones came up with a brilliant idea of their own. They decided to make a project called Hydro Spin, an ingenious desalination device that harnesses wind energy to produce fresh water from seawater. This eco-friendly solution combines simplicity with effectiveness, making it ideal for coastal areas with limited access to clean water and electricity. The children spent a lot of time making their ideas into reality. Each team member worked on different parts of the project, but they also had fun putting everything together and making sure it worked well. Their project, when finished, was nothing short of impressive.

The teams were required to submit their entries in the form of short videos with the students explaining their projects. Mr. Trevor lent his expertise in the field of filming and editing and helped the teams come up with stellar short videos. When asked about how she felt participating in the competition, Chiara from our junior team said, "Being part of this competition made me realize that even small ideas can make a big difference. We all hope that we can keep coming up with more ways to help the Earth in the future!"

Our teams realised that the competition was undoubtedly fierce when they got a chance to view the other teams' projects in an online presentation conducted by the hosts. But at last, the end did crown their work! In the final tally, our juniors unfortunately did not win a top spot, but our senior team with their project designed to impress and to educate, achieved the proud title of First Runners Up!

We congratulate both our teams and their guides for the brilliant efforts, and hope that they get many chances to represent our school and make us proud in the future. And we fully agree with the words of Sofia Bisco from our senior team, "The worst feeling you can feel is never embarrassment, but regret." We hope her words encourage others to put themselves out there and seize opportunities – because you will never know what great things you could accomplish if you don't try at all.

On February 23rd, the Year 7-11 boys set off for an exciting trip to Aquaventure, Atlantis The Palm, one of the biggest and most exciting water parks in the world. Known for its massive slides, winding rivers, and private beach, the park promised a day filled with adventure, fun, and plenty of splashes.




The excitement began even before reaching the park, as the bus ride from school was filled with laughter, music, and chatter about which rides to try first. Students shared their excitement, planned their day, and made the journey itself an enjoyable part of the experience.

As soon as they arrived, the boys had one goal: to explore all three major towers—Poseidon, Neptune, and Trident. With excitement in the air, they rushed towards the towering slides, ready to take on the challenge.

### **Taking on the Towers**

The fun started with Poseidon's Revenge, a ride meant only for the bravest. Riders stepped into a glass capsule, and after a countdown, the floor suddenly disappeared beneath them, sending them down a steep, twisting tube at high speed. Screams and laughter filled the air as each student took their turn, with many running back for a second go.

Another favourite was the Hydra Racer, a four-lane slide where friends raced side by side to see who was the fastest. The friendly competition made the ride even more exciting, with students celebrating their wins and demanding rematches.



After enjoying the excitement of Poseidon Tower, Students eagerly moved on to Trident Tower, which featured thrilling rides like the Odyssey of Terror, known as the world's tallest group waterslide. The fun continued with the Blackout slide, Which is, infamously, the tallest vertical drop in the Middle East with a thrilling plunge into complete darkness that left riders breathless and wanting to go again. Another hot favorite was Shockwave. This ride blends the thrilling features of a traditional rollercoaster with the refreshing excitement of a waterslide. Shockwave ensures that as riders glide through the curves, they also experience a series of unexpected water jets, enhancing the sensation of speed and adding an element of surprise. With thrilling elements such as sudden drops, steep climbs, and unexpected spins

Next up was Trident Tower, where the legendary Leap of Faith awaited our boys. One of the iconic attractions of Aquaventure, this is designed to deliver an exhilarating experience for adrenaline junkies. This ride is so steep that it sends riders down an almost vertical drop before they experience a brief moment of weightlessness. But this was obviously not a deterrent to our boys, as evidenced by everyone who trudged up the Mayan temple-like structure that houses the slide, more than once, seeking that ultimate adrenaline rush!







### The Struggle with Long Queues

With so many people at the park, long lines became a challenge. By midday, wait times for the most popular rides stretched to over an hour, testing the patience of even the most eager riders. One of the longest lines was for Aquaconda, a huge raft ride that twists through tunnels before dropping into a swirling funnel. Waiting in line felt like forever, but the thrilling ride made it worth it.

Mihin Perera (9F) shared his thoughts:

"It was so much fun, and Poseidon's Revenge was definitely worth the 45-minute wait! But I couldn't try all the rides because of the long queues."

### **More Than Just Rides**



### **Day Well Spent**



### UNDER THE SEA

### **EXPLORING HOW MARINE LIFE AND THE OCEANS SHAPE OUR WORLD**

On Thursday, the 30th of January 2025, our senior students eagerly piled into the auditorium taking any chance they possibly could to miss class, completely unaware that, within the next hour, their perspective of the world around them was about to shift.

We walked in ignorant and uneducated on the importance of marine life and the oceans to our world, but we left with our eyes opened to the mystical universe underwater.

The session featured brief lectures by two erudite authors: Helen Czerski, a physicist and oceanographer, and Joe Roman, a conservation biologist and marine ecologist. Each speaker introduced their areas of expertise, of course, not forgetting to include a couple of quirky anecdotes. Helen spoke about her experience with whale earwax while Joe recounted his visit to Surtsey, the world's youngest island (formed in 1963), which began life as a barren, sterile rock, but due to the impact of migrating birds eventually transformed into a lush green paradise, home to a plethora of species.

They also made sure not to exclude any stomach-turning details. Joe revealed pictures showing the poop of various whale species, which had the audience gagging. He concluded with a nauseating fun fact; a lot of beach sand is actually parrotfish poop. This definitely made many beach lovers rethink their past decisions.

Although their lectures were thought-provoking and intriguing, they barely scratched the surface, but providing an all-encompassing lecture was never their goal. Instead, they aimed to ignite a spark, hoping that the curious flame lit in the eager listeners' hearts would inspire them to pursue careers related to the ocean; allowing us to finally uncover the mysteries of the ocean.





An educational session on ocean life and the various careers connected to it are rare, which is exactly why so many of us were thrilled to be given the chance to attend. With the intimidating decision of choosing a future career drawing closer, many sat engrossed; hopeful that a new passion might ignite within them, finally giving them a dream to pursue.

Meanwhile, in the very same hall, I'm certain that many sat down with zero hopes of finding any interest in the topics being discussed. I mean, having to listen to the equivalent of an in-person TED talk on a school day? BORING. Sitting down to listen to random people talk about fish and what not is not the ideal activity, when all you want to do is go home and take a long nap?

But contrary to what we imagined would happen, the speakers managed to defy our expectations by making the session as engaging and intriguing as possible.

The question and answer session held by the speakers proved that everyone who thought they'd leave yawning instead left hungry for more information. There seemed to be no end to the number of raised hands and equally raised curiosity.













The author's visit happened in relation to the annual Emirates Literature Festival, specifically, Helen and Joe were festival authors and our school was offered this opportunity to host them because we enthusiastically take part in many of the festival events, every year.

When asked about this, Ms. Renthi commented, "I believed it would be a great opportunity, especially for the senior science students. It would introduce them to fields of work they probably had no idea even existed, and it would definitely prove to be useful when deciding on their future career".

She also related that Ms. Susanna, our Head of Science was very enthusiastic about this, because "Physics in nature isn't something you get to experience everyday".

Ms. Mary Augustine, our subject leader for Biology shared similar views "I believed it would promote creativity in the students," she stated, "It demonstrates some of the real world writing careers available to them. It would prove particularly useful if they plan on choosing a research related field".

But that doesn't mean the event was reserved for just the science students. "It really piqued my interest, I greatly enjoyed listening and learning more about things I didn't even know existed. It made me want to look at the little things in the world around us," said Sushenya, a commerce student, when asked about her thoughts. "In the end I even regretted not choosing a science subject," she concluded.

This session left us all with one stark realization: there's so much left unexplored on this planet we call 'home'. Our eyes are set on the stars above, instead of on the arcane nature of the world around us. It was a collective wake- up call, reminding us that there is still so much left to discover and learn about our own world.

Undoubtedly, it succeeded in inspiring countless future scientists, researchers, authors and speakers willing to dedicate their life to hopefully unpacking the mystery that is the marine world.





To mend the hearts that quietly bleed.


A silent tear, a knowing glance, A hand held firm In happenstance. Not to fix, nor to deny, But simply sit and stand nearby.

For pain is less when shared with grace, A kindness felt, a warm embrace.





For six unforgettable days in November 2024, a group of passionate students from all around the world gathered in Abu Dhabi for the **Global Network of Religion for Children** (GNRC) Conference themed **"The Child is Calling"**. From our school, we had two students participate, Maria Theres Kizhakkudem of 11D and Mark John Correia of 10C

From the moment the conference began, the air buzzed with energy. Students eagerly stepped up to the podium, discussing global issues, debating policies, and sharing their personal insights. What set this event apart was the freedom it offered—opinions were not just tolerated but welcomed. Too often, young voices are dismissed in formal settings, but here, every idea was met with curiosity rather than criticism. Whether discussing climate change, education reform, or international relations, students felt empowered to contribute in ways they never had before.



The conference was helmed by the GNRC, but it became evident as it progressed that in spite of so many religious leaders collaborating for this, their aim truly was not furthering the agenda of their own particular religion, but rather developing a solid framework for figuring out what the world religions can do for the safety and development of children on a collective and global basis.

As the days unfolded, debates grew more intense, friendships formed, and perspectives expanded. The event wasn't just about a discussion of what religion means to children; in fact religion had very little to do with it. It was about learning to listen, to challenge, and to refine one's own thoughts, and work towards a common goal, that of making the world a better place for our children. By the final day, there was a shared sense of accomplishment. Many students walked away not just with new knowledge, but with a newfound confidence in their ability to express themselves.





Eminent personalities from different walks of life who firmly believe that "In the child lies our future" attended the conference and interacted with these young minds. Most notable among them was Nobel Laureate Mr. Kailash Satyarthi, who won the Nobel Peace Prize in 2014 for his contribution towards the upliftment of children in India.

The delegates also got incredible oppurtunities as part of this, like going on a desert safari and visiting the Sheikh Zayed Grand Mosque, both of which were novel experiences for the majority of the delagation who had come from different parts of the world. But perhaps the most impressive one was visiting the backroom operations at the Yas Seaworld, where away from the glitz and glamour, marine biologists and zoologists tirelessly care for and rehabilitate marine life. This behind-the-scenes activity is not usually open to public.







The participants of the conference, including the two students from our school and the seven others from the other St. Mary's group of schools all said that they feel enriched and enlightened after interacting with children from other countries. Their hearts opened listening to stories of children who come from places that do not have basic amenities, countries that are war torn, children who struggle to have access to things that are taken for granted by the rest of the world, like education, food and clean water.





I thought, "She needs a friend to show."




Then came the new girl, shy and small, Lost in the crowd by the big gym hall. "Want me to show you around the school? It's scary at first—but it's pretty cool!"

# Reading Bingo Read It. Check It. Win It!

Nowadays when you think of a 'book', the images that come to mind may include various science and math textbooks — and perhaps the occasional literature book which is also a textbook. We can confidently say that this challenge helped inspire new readers and reignited their love of reading in others.













As the competition drew to a close, our English teachers had a tough time selecting the winners. There were so many entries, some, who their teachers expected to be in the leaderboard, while some were serendipitous. The organisers were also pleasantly surprised to find that many of our students literally devour books! In any case, the realisation that they were not dealing with timid bookworms, but rather fierce book dragons, was a welcome one!





A few of our students had also attended FWW-MUN, an international MUN endorsed by the UN and having yearly conferences in many parts of the world.



Empathy, Just like sympathy. Is it telepathy?


Empathy, a bridge so wide, Yet so small. that people can't provide.

'You started painting rocks?' Alex asked the girl.



The place boasts an amazing futuristic theme along with several attractions and games keeping the children entertained.





## How to Practice Empathy


Empathy isn't something you're born with—it's something you can get better at with practice. Here are some ways to practice empathy every day:
