IMPORTANT PARENT AWARENESS: KHDA *has alerted all private schools about observations regarding dangerous physical behaviours among students, including choking, breath-holding, applying pressure to the neck, forceful contact to the head, and participation in social media trends such as the 'skull breaker challenge'. These actions are often presented as joking or play but they pose serious immediate risks to students' health and even have the implications of being life threatening.*

We have attached an infographic from DHA regarding these dangerous physical behaviours. We are strongly urging ALL parents to have age-appropriate conversations with your children about the risks involved with various dangerous physical behaviours which could also be life threatening. The school would also have to report any of these to the relevant external authorities.

Parents are strongly reminded to kindly monitor your child's online usage and use of social media including online games so that you are aware of the content that your child is accessing.

St. Mary's Catholic High School has a strict 'NO TOUCH' policy wherein NO STUDENT is allowed to TOUCH another student or have any PHYSICAL CONTACT with another student even as a form of play, a joke, a game etc. Kindly reiterate this to your children.

It is for this reason that games like tag, black shoe etc are strictly prohibited because what often starts out as a game ends up with someone getting hurt.

ATTENTION TO ALL PARENTS: “PANTSING” – An overview for ALL PARENTS. Pantsing is an act of physical bullying where a victim’s trousers are pulled down in a public setting. While many children and students view Pantsing as a prank or a joke or a playful act, we **MUST** remind them that in the UAE this is strictly viewed as a form of Bullying and will be treated in that context. This act could have serious psychological trauma on students and cause lasting embarrassment. **We ARE STRONGLY REMINDING ALL PARENTS** to talk to your children and explain to them that under **NO CIRCUMSTANCES MUST ANYONE COMMIT THIS ACT.**

DANGEROUS GAMES THAT HAVE POTENTIAL FOR INJURY: We would like to bring to the attention of parents that some students, particularly boys in Years 5-9 have been playing games like ‘black shoe’ or ‘shoe tag’ during the break. This involves large groups of boys, running after each other, trying to stamp another’s shoe/foot. This happens in the setting of a crowded quadrangle of children during the breaktime, many of whom are sitting and eating their snacks. The act of strongly stamping another’s foot/shoe could lead to serious injury and we urge parents to kindly speak to your children about the potential dangers. We will not be permitting them to indulge in such games.

NOT STANDING NEAR ANY DOOR (EITHER AT HOME OR AT SCHOOL): We would also like parents to talk to children and reiterate to them the dangerous implications of hanging around or standing near doors. We have quite often noticed that children tend to move near the door to peep out in between lessons to look for the arrival of the next teacher, sometimes a child returning from the washroom may not see them and upon suddenly opening the door could potentially and unknowingly injure the person near the door. Proximity to any door could always have the potential for fingers getting jammed or other injuries and we would urge ALL parents to sit with children and have these important conversations with them.

1) RE-REGISTRATION FOR THE NEXT ACADEMIC YEAR 2026-2027 (YEARS 1-10 AND YEAR 12): We have attached an important circular with regard to re-registering your child for the next Academic Year 2026-2027. It is important that you go through the circular carefully.

2) PROPOSED FEE INCREMENT FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR 2026-2027 (Years 1-12): Parents are asked to please check the attached circular.

3) PROPOSAL FOR TERM ONE EXAMS BEFORE THE WINTER BREAK: Parents are requested to please read this proposal and fill in the Google survey. We are grateful for all the parent feedback over the last two years that have helped us look at this as a way forward. Now we would like your thoughts.

4) AWARENESS SESSIONS FOR PARENTS ON NARCOTICS/DRUGS/ TOBACCO AND VAPING (YEARS 7-13): We have organised three sessions on these topics to raise awareness among parents so that we can keep our children safe. Sessions have been organised at 8:00 am, 9:00 am and 11:00 am and parents are warmly invited to attend any one of these sessions. We have arranged these sessions on the report day since most of you will already be at the school on Saturday, 21st February 2026.

5) APTITUDE TESTING FOR STUDENTS OF YEAR 8 & 11: We have attached a separate circular for this. This is completely optional. The cost is **AED 260/-** per child if you choose to register. This is completely optional, but we encourage students to make use of this opportunity as this gives parents and students critical information before making these important subject-choice decisions. Payment is to be made on SKIPLY. Please email your child's class teacher the Skiplly receipt. **FINAL DEADLINE TO PAY TO REGISTER IS 2nd MARCH 2026.**

6) KOMODO WELL-BEING SURVEY YEARS 7, 8 AND 9, 25th FEBRUARY 2026: We would like to remind all parents of Years 7, 8 and 9 to ensure that your children carry a fully charged laptop/tablet on 25th February to complete their well-being survey.

7) YEAR 12 MOCK EXAM TIMETABLE: Parents of Year 12 students who are sitting for mock examinations are requested to kindly check the Mock Exam Timetable attached to this circular.

8) IBT ARABIC A AND B RESULTS: Parents are requested to kindly note that the IBT Arabic A and B reports have been sent to your child's email. Please check this carefully.

9) DISPERSAL NOTICE (Parents of Years 1 to 3): At our school, every child is precious to us. Their health, safety, and security remain our absolute priorities.

Recently, we have observed increased chaos during dismissal times due to parents waiting outside of designated zones and, in some cases, disregarding the instructions of school staff and student prefects. We must address this immediately, as crowding in non-designated areas poses a direct risk to the safe dispersal of our students.

To ensure a secure environment for everyone, we kindly ask for your strict cooperation with the following:

- **Designated Waiting Area:** Please wait for your children ONLY on the designated sides of the Girls Ground Floor. This is essential to maintain a smooth, supervised flow of children to the Holding Area.
- **Follow Official Guidance:** We request that you localise your presence to the marked areas and strictly follow the directions provided by our staff and student prefects. They are there to ensure your child's safety.
- **Yielding to Exit Paths:** Please be mindful of senior students exiting through Gates 4 & 5 and STS bus users exiting through Gate 3. It is vital that these pathways remain clear; please give way to these students as they transition.

We understand that dismissal can be a busy time, but we cannot compromise on safety. By adhering to these arrangements, you help us ensure that every child leaves the campus securely and without incident.

Thank you for your immediate attention to this matter and for partnering with us to keep our students safe..

10) SUBJECT ORIENTATIONS FOR YEAR 8 STUDENTS ON 25th & 26th February for girls and on 27th February and 2nd March for boys: We have organised subject orientations for YEAR 8 students. Students will be engaged for some part of the day. They must have a refill pad and a pen to note down key information. They must also have their regular snacks and water. We will let them know which books to bring on those days.

11) SIMPLY BOTTLES RECYCLING CAMPAIGN WINNING CLASSES: We would like to announce the whole class winners of the Simply Bottles Campaign. The classes that collected the highest number of bottles are 4F, 5B, 6F and 9A. We would once again like to thank the children for their immense efforts towards sustainability. We will be organising picnics for the winning classes after Ramadan. We will send separate letters to the parents of these classes later.

12) ADMISSIONS TO YEAR ONE, YEAR TWO and YEARS THREE TO TEN FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR 2026- 2027: We would like to inform all parents that the admissions notices for the Academic Year 2026 – 2027 have been uploaded to the school website and we have attached them to this circular as well. 13) RAMADAN OFFERING TO THE MOSQUE (WHOLE SCHOOL): . 14) FIRST TERM EXAMINATION SCRIPTS (YEARS 1-10 AND YEAR 12): All Parents are requested to kindly ensure that ALL answer scripts MUST be sent back with your child if you have not yet done so. Please note that once returned, answer scripts will no longer be available for your reference.

15) MOCK EXAMINATIONS YEARS 11 AND 13 AND SERIOUS TIME FOR STUDY NOW: Please note that the Mock Examinations for Years 11 and 13 will run from the 9th to the 13th of March before the Spring Break and the 30th and 31st of March 2026 and the 6th to the 9th of April 2026. Students must report to school at sharp 7:00 am. No leave will be sanctioned during Mock Examinations. **Any medical illnesses even for one day will require a medical certificate.** The Mock Exam Timetables have been uploaded to the school website and have been attached to this circular.

We urge parents to please monitor students doing board examinations as we have found a lack of seriousness among many students. This is a critical time for solving past papers, clearing doubts and undertaking intensive revision.

We still find that many students are not displaying a responsible attitude towards their studies and this will impact them negatively in the long run. Parents will need to be more active in monitoring their social media use and any other time that is not spent fruitfully. We urge children to use this short time left to maximise their revision and preparation for the Pearson Edexcel Exams in May-June 2026.

17) ONLINE SCHOOL ON THE 2ND AND 3RD OF APRIL 2026 , YEARS 1-13: All parents are requested to kindly note that we have received permission from KHDA to have two days of online school on the 2nd and 3rd of April 2026. This is to ensure the safety of our students and staff due to the large crowds that will be accessing the area on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. More details about lessons and online lesson links will be sent before the Spring Break.

18) SCHOOL JACKET/HOODIE IDENTIFICATION: All parents of children are requested to kindly sew clear name tags on the inside of school jackets/ hoodies. This is to help clearly identify lost items especially in situations where one jacket might be claimed by more than one student as their own and without any clear identification becomes impossible to determine the rightful owner of the lost item.

19) NO BARTERING / EXCHANGE OF GOODS OR SHARING OF FOOD FOR THE GOOD OF ALL CHILDREN: We have recently come across a few cases of children across various Year groups bringing in items from home to exchange with their classmates for food or a snack item . These items have included but are not limited to small toys, gift cards, collectible cards, stickers, etc. We are certain that as parents you understand that many children suffer from food allergies and in the excitement could consume something that has ingredients to which they are allergic. The act of trading has many potential implications that are beyond the maturity of young children to deal with. It has the potential to cause arguments and fights. Often, children are trading for an item that you as parents do not allow them to consume, for example chewing gum . We are urging all parents to kindly ensure that children are not bringing any items to school other than what is required for their learning in lessons.

20) FOURTH SUBJECT DROP (GCE / IAL SUBJECTS ONLY) –YEAR 12

STUDENTS: We have been receiving subject drop forms signed by parents and these are being duly processed where required evidence of the requirement of only three subjects has been provided. Once a subject has been dropped it cannot later be re-taken due to a loss of curricular hours. Parents are therefore requested to carefully consider this decision. There is no deadline for dropping the fourth subject.

21) ENOUGH WATER TO BE SENT WITH CHILDREN OR A FEW AED 1 COINS TO

PURCHASE WATER FROM THE MACHINES: Parents of students especially those in lower primary are requested to kindly send enough drinking water with your child or one or two AED 1 coins so they can be assisted with getting water from the machines. For reasons of hygiene and safety there are no drinking water fountains.

22) BREAKFAST/ SNACK FIRST THING IN THE MORNING: We recognise that many children, especially those travelling on long bus journeys to reach school every morning, find it difficult to have their breakfast so early in the morning and some suffer travel illness. We would like to inform parents that it's perfectly alright to send a packed snack or breakfast with your child so that they may eat it in class first thing in the morning when they reach school. This is a much healthier option than children being on an empty stomach for long hours.

24) SOCIAL MEDIA FREQUENT CHECKS BY PARENTS FOR SECONDARY &

UPPER PRIMARY CHILDREN: Parents of secondary and upper primary children are strongly encouraged to kindly make frequent checks of your child's use of Social Media. We have seen in many cases that minor children are being sought out on Instagram, Snapchat and other platforms by much older individuals for chats and conversations. It is important for parents to know who their children are conversing with to protect them from any potential safeguarding issues. We would also like to remind parents about your children's use of inappropriate content and language on Social Media Platforms which you will be aware of only if you make frequent checks of the same. Please have your child remove himself/herself from private social media groups that are not encouraged or recommended by us at St. Mary's. The school cannot take responsibility for private groups started by students, and we strongly discourage the formation

of these groups as well as discourage student participation in them. It is once again important here that ALL PARENTS check your children's digital activity frequently including group activity if your child is part of private groups created by students.

25) ADMISSION TO A-LEVELS (PARENTS OF CURRENT YEAR 11 STUDENTS):

26) UNIFORM INFRACTIONS: Parents are hereby notified that we have been very disappointed with the large number of uniform infractions , especially among senior students. *These include very long and unruly hair of boys (kindly ensure that proper haircuts are undertaken this weekend) , long hair of girls untied, coloured and highlighted hair of girls we have specifically reminded parents at the end of last Year that this is strictly not allowed) , multiple ear piercings for girls, shorter than acceptable skirt lengths , long fingernails of both boys and girls, heavy make -up on girls.* What is even more disappointing is the lack of collaboration from parents when we correct students for the same. Parents are requested to please check on your children before they leave home in the morning. Please refer to the uniform policy .

27) STUDENT SCHOOL EMAIL ID: Your child's school email will be a focal point for our communication to you. **We will use a parent's email only to communicate outstanding fee or disciplinary issues.** A **CLASS GROUP EMAIL** has been created using the students 'official email ID for every class. This is for the dissemination of information daily from the class teacher to the parents of this class and we request parents not to write back to this address. We recommend that every parent checks this email after 6:00 pm every day for important updates. New students will receive their school email Ids on Monday.

28) APPROVED KHDA CALENDAR FOR ACADEMIC YEAR 2025-2026: Parents are requested to check the approved KHDA School Calendar for the Academic Year 2025 available on school website for your easy reference. This will help you plan ahead. If the regulators make any changes to the same, we will inform you immediately. Please note that only emergency medical / bereavement leave will be approved during school days. Leave for family holidays and celebrations must coincide with the school holidays as per the KHDA calendar.

Leave for events like graduations, weddings, parties etc will not be granted during school days and if absences like this occur during exams, there will be no re-exams in that case. We expect parents to respect these dates and not request leave during school days.

We are in the process of organizing our records for the next **Academic Year 2026-2027**.

Please fill up this form, sign and send **a printed copy** to your son / daughter's class teacher by **8th April 2026 as the final date for the form to be received by the school.**

Please read the following information very carefully before you make your final choice:

CRITERIA FOR RE-REGISTERING YOUR CHILD FOR THE NEXT ACADEMIC YEAR 2026-2027- Please note that filling out this form is MANDATORY for every parent.

- 1) There should **not be any OUTSTANDING FEES** for the current Academic Year 2025-2026. In case you re-register your child by error but still have outstanding fees, then the **AED 500/-** which is the re-registration amount will be adjusted towards the **OUTSTANDING FEE** and **WILL NOT** be considered as a **RE-REGISTRATION AMOUNT**. In addition, students who have **OUTSTANDING AMOUNTS** by the end of this year will automatically not **be re-registered for the next Academic Year**. We strongly urge **ALL** parents who still have Outstanding Fees to clear these without any further delay.

- 2) Please be informed that even though the KHDA sends out the Parent-School Contract to all parents by default via email, it will not be considered binding even if you sign it, if you still have outstanding fees for your ward.

Dear Parents,

Greetings from St. Mary's. It is at this time that we wish to provide you with the following information pertaining to a proposed **6%** increase in Tuition Fees, subject to KHDA approval, for the Academic year 2026-2027.

We would like to thank our parent community for your constant support and collaboration. Our mission has always been to provide good quality education that is affordable. Our fee level remains the lowest when compared with other schools that provide the UK Curriculum, a good number of which charge significantly more than St. Mary's. We are a Not-for-Profit institution, and the proposed fee hike is only to help the school sustain its day-to-day operations.

Cost pressures apply to St. Mary's as much as they do to many other entities and in fact rising costs have impacted our school significantly due to our extremely low fee structure. In spite of diligent financial stewardship and control of expenses, we continually face huge challenges with rising costs with respect to staffing, resources, maintenance costs, refurbishment upgrades and operational expenses.

The following important cost-impact considerations are being shared with you:

- 1) The new Arabic Language Statutory Mandate for Early years from MOE will necessitate hiring additional staff for implementation to achieve full compliance.
- 2) The school must be fully compliant with new SIRA mandated guidelines for Private schools in Dubai. Please see the attached document for your reference.

- 3) The school MUST meet its Emiratisation quotas to be compliant with the Emiratisation staffing requirement.
- 4) The school has completely refurbished both ICT labs with brand new and upgraded systems to meet the external examination requirements for ICT and Computer Science.
- 5) The school will be introducing IAS/IAL Computer Science.
- 6) The school must meet KHDA's inspection recommendation to ensure that the curriculum meets the NCFE requirements, which will also necessitate additional staffing.
- 7) Introduction of additional learning technologies.

We hope you will recognize that our decision to propose a 6% increase in the tuition fees is to sustain the operational needs of the school in supporting its expenses while continuing to provide a good quality education for our children.

PROPOSAL TO SHIFT FIRST TERM EXAMINATIONS TO BEFORE THE WINTER BREAK - We need your thoughts.

Dear Parents,

Greetings from St. Mary's.

We would like to address recent feedback from our school community regarding the academic calendar. Many parents and students have requested that the First Term Examinations be held prior to the Winter Break, rather than in January. We are grateful to those who have met with us to discuss the rationale behind our current structure.

In our commitment to student well-being and academic excellence, our Senior Leadership and Subject Heads have reviewed this request. We are now considering a formal shift in the calendar and invite you to share your perspective.

Understanding the Current Academic Cycle

Our school follows the UK Curriculum on a two-term system with three primary testing points. Please review the current structure below to understand how a shift would impact the academic year:

Term One (August – January)	Term Two (Late January – June)
Duration: ~16 teaching weeks + 2 exam weeks	Duration: ~16 teaching weeks + 2 exam weeks

Note: The timing for International Benchmark Tests (KHDA mandated) is strictly determined by external testing authorities and cannot be altered by the school.

Key Considerations for the Proposed Change

If we move the First Term Examinations to December (before the Winter Break), the following adjustments will occur:

Shift in Mid-Term Assessments: The mid-term assessment, typically held in October, would shift to February/March. These assessments cover a narrower range of content and traditionally help students secure stronger attainment and progress scores.

Reporting Schedule: Examination reports would be issued in late January or early February.

Years 11 and 13 (Board Years – Current Years 10 & 12): These students would receive a mid-term report based on assessments conducted in June/ August / September 2026. They will not participate in the February/March mid-terms as they will be preparing for or sitting their Mock Examinations.

Preparation: Exam portions would be shared in September 2026. This shift requires students to maintain a consistent daily study routine rather than relying on last-minute preparation.

Next Steps

We value your partnership in this decision. In addition to this parent consultation, we will be surveying students to gauge their feelings on the change.

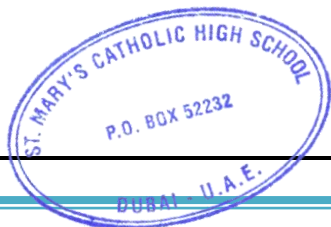

Purpose of This Guide

This guide aims to help parents and caregivers understand risky adolescent behaviours, recognise early warning signs, and respond to them effectively and supportively, and to prevent physical and psychological harm associated with risky challenges, especially digital ones.

Introduction

Adolescence is a period of rapid physical, emotional, and social development. During this stage, some teenagers may experiment behaviours that place their & others' health or safety at risk. Understanding these behaviours helps parents respond calmly, effectively, and protectively.

What are Risky Teen Behaviours?

Risky behaviours are actions that may lead to physical, psychological, social, or educational harm to the adolescent or others.

These include:

1.

Behavioural risks:

Aggression, truancy, self-harm, rule breaking.

2.

Substance-related risks:

Smoking, vaping, other

3.

Digital risks:

Online challenges, cyberbullying.

4.

Emotional risks:

Anxiety, depression.

5.

Social risks:

Peer pressure, isolation.

6.

Others

Why Teenagers Engage in Risky Behaviours?

These behaviors are due to several overlapping factors, most notably:



Peer pressure and desire for acceptance and belonging & fear of rejection or ridicule.



Increased sensitivity to reward and excitement.



Ongoing brain development affecting impulse control and decision-making.



Academic pressure and fear of failure.



Emotional stress, anxiety, or depression.



Identity formation curiosity and boundary testing.



Lack of clear rules or parental supervision.



Seeking attention on social media.



Influence of social media and digital trends.

Online Risky Challenges and Digital Trends

These are behaviours promoted through digital platforms to gain attention, likes, or views. They often do not show the real consequences or resulting injuries, which increases the risk of imitation. Through the following platforms:

1.

Short-form video platforms to amplify imitation.

2.

Messaging apps that increase secrecy and peer pressure.

3.

Gaming and live-streaming platforms that may encourage risky performance.

Dangerous Dares and Challenges Students May Face

1

Breath-holding or choking challenges:

- Breath-holding until loss of consciousness.
- Choking or blackout games.

2

Extreme physical challenges:

- Jumping from heights.
- Running into traffic or across roads.
- Climbing buildings or riding on moving vehicles.

3

Pain-tolerance or harm-based dares:

- Burning the skin.
- Slapping or hitting challenges.
- Consuming extremely spicy or harmful substances.

4

Self-harm challenges:

- Cutting or scratching behaviours.
- Starvation or dehydration dares.

5

Abuse or bullying-based dares:

- Filming or sharing humiliating pranks.
- Forcing peers into embarrassing or degrading acts.

Health Consequences of Dangerous Challenges

It is essential that parents are familiar with the fact that these challenges can lead to serious health consequences, including:

Breath-Holding or Choking Challenges May Lead To:

- Loss of consciousness.
- Brain damage due to lack of oxygen.
- Seizures.
- Cardiac arrest.
- Sudden death.

Dangerous Physical dares May Lead To:

- Head injuries or concussion.
- Fractures and spinal injuries.
- Internal bleeding.
- Permanent disability or death.

Pain or Injury Challenges May Lead To:

- Burns and infections.
- Nerve damage.
- Permanent scarring.
- Chronic pain.

Imitating Self-Harm Increases the Risk of:

- Repeated self-harm.
- Depression and anxiety.
- Serious self-harm thought.

Substance-Use Challenges May Lead To:

- Poisoning.
- Respiratory failure.
- Addiction.
- Long-term damage to the brain, liver, or lungs.

Humiliation and Bullying Challenges Are Associated With:

- Severe psychological distress.
- Anxiety and depression.
- School refusal.
- Self-harm thoughts.

The Role of Parents

Talking to Your Teenager

How should parents talk to their teenager?

- Choose a calm and appropriate time.
- Listen without judgment or criticism.
- Ask open-ended questions.
- Focus on safety rather than punishment.
- Build trust and mutual respect.

(B)

Setting Healthy Boundaries

Clear, age-appropriate boundaries provide structure and safety. Rules should be discussed openly, applied consistently, and reviewed regularly as the teenager grows.

(C)

Setting Healthy Digital Boundaries

- Establish clear, age-appropriate rules.
- Discuss acceptable online behaviour.
- Use monitoring tools as protection, not punishment.
- Hold regular conversations about digital content.

The Role of Parents

(D)

Assess their Emotional Vulnerability

Teen stress and emotional difficulties may present as risky or challenging behaviour. Academic pressure, social stress, and digital exposure can increase vulnerability. Emotional support and early recognition of distress are critical protective factors.

Children are more likely to engage in risky dares if they are:

- Experiencing stress, bullying, or loneliness.
- Struggling with self-esteem.
- Seeking validation or attention.
- Coping with family or academic pressure.

(E)

Recognising Warning Signs

Warning signs may appear gradually or suddenly. While a single sign may not indicate serious risk, patterns or multiple changes require attention.

● Behavioural Warning Signs:

- Increased aggression or defiance.
- Repeated rule-breaking.
- Increased secrecy or lying.
- Excessive focus on trends or challenges.
- Risk-taking behaviours that are out of character.
- Heightened need for peer approval or fear of being excluded.
- Hiding devices or online activity.

● Emotional and Psychological Warning Signs:

- Loss of interest in activities.
- Persistent sadness or irritability.
- Anxiety or emotional withdrawal.

The Role of Parents

(E) Recognising Warning Signs

● Social Warning Signs:

- Withdrawal from family or friends.
- Sudden change in peer group.
- Avoidance of social activities.

● Academic Warning Signs:

- Decline in academic performance.
- Frequent absenteeism.
- Loss of motivation toward school.

● Physical and Digital Warning Signs:

- Unexplained injuries, bruises, burns, cuts, or marks.
- Changes in sleep or appetite.

(F)

Asking direct but safe questions

Parents should ask clearly, calmly, and without judgment.

Examples:

- “Have you seen any online challenges recently?”
- “Has anyone asked you to do something that felt unsafe?”
- “What would you do if a friend dared you to try something risky?”

(G)

What parents should do when warning signs appear

- Stay calm and observant.
- Start a supportive conversation.
- Focus on safety and wellbeing.
- Seek professional help early if needed.

What to Avoid?

Overreaction, shaming, public conflict, fear-based punishment, or ignoring early signs can escalate risk and reduce adolescent disclosure.

Protective Factors that reduce risky behaviour



Emotional regulation skills.



Clear family values.



Strong parent-child relationship.



Positive peer networks.



Trusted adult support.

Know when to Seek Professional Help

Professional support should be sought:

- When behaviours persist, escalate, or
- When they are linked to mental health
- When its affecting his daily functioning

When Should Immediate Help Be Sought?

Immediate medical or psychological help is required if there is:

Key Messages for Parents

- Risky behaviours are signs of stress or unmet needs—not bad character.
- Early communication protects adolescents.
- Safety is more important than punishment.
- The family is the first line of protection.

What Parents Can Do Today?

- Watch for changes in behaviour or mood.
- Have regular, calm conversations with your teenager.
- Know your teenager's friends and daily routine.
- Agree on clear rules for online and offline behaviour.
- Promote digital literacy and critical thinking.
- Explain the risks of online challenges.
- Model safe, responsible behaviours.
- Maintain open channels for disclosure.
- Seek advice early if you are concerned

Parenting teenagers can be challenging, and you are not expected to handle concerns alone. Early, calm support and consistent boundaries can prevent escalation and protect your teenager's safety and wellbeing.
